'Untitled (Eat Good) Food Series' in the café offers a showcase of Caribbean meals from photographer, Rochelle White.

ROOM 2

Hackney Museum, George Padmore Institute 10.30am – 7pm

Hackney has been shaped by people from around the world. The museum brings Windrush suitcases and actors to tell the tales of the Windrush migrants. Hear why Caribbeans were invited to Britain after WW2 and discover the true stories behind the headlines. They are joined by the George Padmore Institute (GPI) which houses a 20th century archive of more than 40 years of UK black activism.
